Seasonal Affective Disorder:

I miss the sun! Ohio in the winter can have daylight hours as short as 6 ½ a day. Ohio also sees the sun less than 50% of the 365 days in a year, more in the winter. In winter, shorter days leave many people with little to no sun exposure, signaling the brain to create too much of the sleep-regulating hormone melatonin. This overproduction of melatonin leads to seasonal affective disorder (SAD), a mood disorder that affects an estimated 10 to 20 percent of the population.

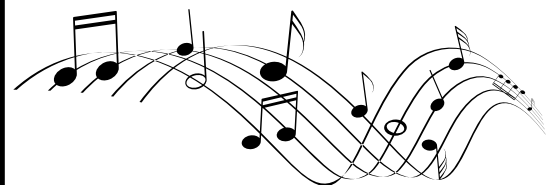
How to Combat Seasonal Affective Disorder:

- Keep to a schedule and practice wellness- a routine helps your body, including regular sleep, exercise, and water intake.
- Light therapy- artificial when you need but make sure to sit in a window or outside when the sun is shining for at least 10 minutes. More if you can!
- Cultivate winter hobbies- find indoor ways to feel productive.
- Find help. See a doctor or therapist if symptoms are affecting your ability to complete daily activities.

COURSE FEATURE: KINGDOMS OF LIFE

Taught by Beth Ogg

Kingdoms of Life is a science elective that looks at the relationships of organisms based on their taxonomy. Students start with sponges (porifera) and jellyfish (cnidaria) and work their way up through chordates. At the beginning of the year, students start with a project to research individual animals and the biomes where they live. They then move to general taxonomy as to how the different kingdoms of life are organized. Students break each group of animals down by examining the different characteristics and see how animals become more complex as you move through the animal kingdom.
